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# THE FUTURE OF HIRING

## WHY SKILLS MATTER MORE THAN CV'S

It has become increasingly evident that the future of work does not belong to the best CV, it belongs to the person who can solve problems, adapt quickly within the work environment, and bring fresh ideas to the table. We are seeing this trend gain global traction, with companies like Google, IBM and Unilever shifting their focus to prioritise a “skills-first” hiring approach. Closer to home, in a country where unemployment is at an all-time high, especially amongst the youth, talented people are being excluded from opportunities due to lack of “traditional” CV credentials. But the tide is turning, even in South Africa, and the future of hiring may lie in recognising skills, not only focusing on degrees.

### **The Global Shift: The Skills-First Hiring Movement**

Simply put, the term “skills-first hiring” is a hiring approach or strategy which seeks to prioritise a candidate’s skills, experience, and abilities over more traditional factors like formal education or prior job titles. This approach opens doors for more people who have in the past been excluded for lack of credentials to participate in the formal economy.

This shift is also not happening in isolation. With rapid technological advancements, including the increasing use of automation in the workplace, and unprecedented number of economic disruptions, the World Economic Forum predicted in its 2020 report that half of all employees would need to be reskilled by the year 2025. In response, Microsoft and LinkedIn launched a global skills initiative designed to train and equip job seekers in practical digital skills to ensure they are able to compete in today’s digital and skills-based economy.

### **Why This Matters in South Africa**

By accessing the skills-first strategy, organisations are able to:

**-Unlock untapped talent in townships, rural areas, and informal sectors:** South Africa boasts a growing informal economy. While official statistics estimate that it contributes between 6%-10% to the national GDP, industry players suggest that it may even be higher. Leveraging talent, entrepreneurs and youth in these areas unlocks skills and potential in often overlooked areas.

**-Support in closing the gender gap:** In South Africa, women largely acquire valuable skills through contexts that do not necessarily reflect on a CV and are not necessarily acquired through formal education. This includes running small businesses, managing household finances, coordinating community initiatives, caregiving, or taking part in informal sector work. These roles often develop strong abilities in areas like problem-solving, financial management, leadership, organisation and negotiation.

**-Support transformation in the workplace:** Given structural inequalities, many South Africans in historically disadvantaged groups still cannot access tertiary education and consequently aren't able to participate fully in the formal economy. By shifting the focus to skills, organisations are able to include a broader pool of candidates and talent.

### **What This Means for Women Entrepreneurs**

Not only do female business leaders juggle many balls, but they also often face resource constraints, including financial restrictions, human resources, network and market access and time constraints. A skills-first hiring approach allows women to:

**-Build lean, agile teams with the necessary skill and problem-solving ability to strive despite resource limitations.**

**-Reduce the risk of “paper-qualified but practically weak” hires,** who offer the formal credentials but lack the real-world skills, attitude, or cultural fit to perform effectively in the workplace.

**-Mentor and grow raw talent, giving them an opportunity to thrive and empowering them to, in turn, make a difference.**

### **Adapting to the Skills-First Movement**

**-Rethink what is required in a job description:** While formal qualifications are not irrelevant, it does not provide the complete picture of a candidate's capabilities. Instead of requiring the candidate to have a BCom in Finance only, ask whether they are able to build appropriate financial models for your business.

**-Prioritise assessments over CVs:** Before hiring talent, allow them the opportunity to participate in the necessary problem-solving exercises and skill assessments to evaluate whether they are a good fit. This will separate the wheat from the chaff.

**-Leverage technology:** In this digital age, it is important to use the appropriate software and technology to ensure you do not fall behind.

**-Invest in training and partner with mentorship programmes:** Upskilling staff and exposing them to mentorship programmes empowers them to access skills, tools and networks that ensure growth and sustainability in your business.

### **A Call to Action**

Skills-first hiring is not just a global movement, it is a pathway to building stronger, more resilient businesses in South Africa. By recognising adaptability, creativity, emotional intelligence, and tech-savviness as the true drivers of growth, women entrepreneurs have the opportunity to reshape the way we think about talent. The CV might tell us where someone has been, but skills tell us where they can go, and where they can take our businesses. By embracing this mindset now, women leaders can set the pace for inclusive, future-ready enterprises that uplift individuals, strengthen communities, and fuel South Africa's transformation.

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# WOMEN, BUSINESS, AND ECONOMIC GROWTH IN SOUTH AFRICA

**Women are increasingly stepping into leadership and business ownership across South Africa, including sectors that were historically male dominated. Today, women own nearly 22% of businesses, with stronger representation in services and transport.**

As South Africa celebrated Women's Month in August this year, we have an opportunity to reflect on the powerful role women play in business and economic development. This year is particularly significant as South Africa hosts the G20 Presidency and engages with the Women 20 (W20) initiative, placing the spotlight on women entrepreneurs as essential drivers of inclusive growth (G20 W20, 2024).

Women are increasingly stepping into leadership and business ownership across South Africa, including sectors that were historically male dominated. Today, women own nearly 22% of businesses, with stronger representation in services and transport; however, there is lower representation in manufacturing, agriculture, and construction (PIC, 2023). Women also hold about 29% of top management roles, and in some mid-sized companies, they occupy 47% of senior management positions (Women's Report, 2023). These businesses support millions of jobs and contribute significantly to the economy, generating around R175-billion annually (DTIC, 2023).

## **Women's impact beyond entrepreneurship**

Women's influence goes beyond starting businesses. In corporate leadership, women hold 35% of CEO roles, 53% of CFO positions, and 57% of HR director roles, while in the public sector, women make up 45% of senior management (BWASA, 2022). Female labour force participation has grown from 50.9% to 55.8% over the past decade (Women's Report, 2023).

## **Challenges facing women in business**

Despite these achievements, challenges remain. Many women start businesses based on personal skills or passions, but without access to proper training, funding, markets, or networks, it is difficult to grow.

The Global Entrepreneurship Monitor South Africa (GEM SA, 2023) report highlights a notable gender gap in business growth: only 4.9% of women-owned businesses grow to employ 20 or more people, compared to 11.8% of men's ventures. Women are also more likely to operate as solo-preneurs (4.9%) than men (1%), showing that while women are active in business creation, scaling and industrial integration remain challenges.

These challenges are particularly visible in manufacturing, a sector crucial to South Africa's industrial growth and global trade ambitions. Manufacturing contributes roughly 11% of GDP and employs about 14% of the workforce, yet women remain underrepresented, especially in technical and craft roles. In 2023, women held only 24.4% of trade positions, highlighting the need for targeted initiatives to ensure equitable participation (Women's Report, 2023). Access to finance, technical training, mentorship, and integration into supply chains remains limited.

Cultural and family responsibilities can further restrict time and mobility, making it harder for women to scale their businesses and take on leadership positions. Despite these obstacles, women continue to innovate and grow in niches such as jewellery manufacturing, agro-processing, and specialized industrial products.

### **W20 initiatives and global advocacy**

The Women 20 (W20) initiative, part of the G20, focuses on advancing women's economic empowerment globally. The W20 promotes access to finance for women-led businesses, encourages women to enter STEM and leadership roles, and works to remove barriers to trade and industrial participation. For South Africa, these objectives are particularly important in manufacturing, where technical skills, innovation, and supply chain integration are essential. By connecting women entrepreneurs with training programs, networks, and global markets, W20 initiatives help them scale their businesses and compete internationally.

### **Government-led support and financing**

South Africa has also implemented targeted programs to support women entrepreneurs, particularly in manufacturing. The Department of Trade, Industry, and Competition (DTIC) provides skills development, enterprise support, and market access programs for women in manufacturing, agro-processing, and export-oriented industries (DTIC, 2023). Complementing this, the National Empowerment Fund (NEF) offers start-up and expansion capital, along with guidance on regulatory compliance and accessing supply chains (NEF, 2024).

Blended finance programs, combining public and private investment, help women scale their businesses more efficiently. Policies such as B-BBEE incentivize corporate procurement from women-owned businesses, promote ownership and management participation, and create industrial opportunities that were previously difficult to access (Women's Report, 2023). Together, these initiatives provide a strong foundation for women to grow their businesses and take leadership roles in manufacturing and beyond.

### **The OR Tambo SEZ: A model for women-led growth**

The OR Tambo Special Economic Zone (SEZ) in Gauteng demonstrates how infrastructure, policy, and training support can help women succeed in manufacturing and export-oriented industries. Strategically located near Africa's busiest airport, the SEZ provides access to regional and international markets, supporting small, medium, and large enterprises alike (OR Tambo SEZ, 2025). Women-owned businesses in the SEZ are increasingly integrating into supply chains, particularly in jewellery manufacturing, agro-processing, and niche manufacturing sectors. The SEZ provides skills training, business development support, and export readiness programs, equipping women with the tools and confidence to scale their operations and compete globally.

### **Looking ahead: Women driving growth**

South Africa has an opportunity to accelerate industrial growth by empowering women in business. With access to finance, skills, mentorship, and market opportunities, women in manufacturing can scale businesses, take leadership roles, and contribute to the country's global competitiveness. Women are not only creating jobs but they are bringing innovation, strengthening supply chains, and driving inclusive economic growth.

The message is clear: women are building businesses, shaping industries, and leading South Africa toward a more inclusive and prosperous economic future. With the right support, the possibilities are endless, and the next generation of women entrepreneurs will be key drivers of industrial and national growth.

## PAIA

### The change in POPIA 2025

#### Strengthening South Africans' Privacy and Transparency Rights: POPIA 2013, the April 2025 amended Regulations, and PAIA's 2022 Landscape

Johannesburg, South Africa — 26 September 2025 — South Africans' rights to privacy and access to information have been further clarified and strengthened. The Information Regulator has issued amended Regulations to the Protection of Personal Information Act, 2013 (POPIA), effective 17 April 2025, while the Promotion of Access to Information Act 2020 as amended (PAIA) continues to entrench open, accountable governance following key amendments that took effect in recent years.

#### What POPIA is—and what changed in April 2025

POPIA governs how organisations collect, use, share, and secure personal information. On 17 April 2025, the Information Regulator published amendments to the POPIA Regulations with immediate effect. These amendments streamline and strengthen data-subject rights (objections, corrections/deletions, and consent for direct marketing) with updated prescribed forms and procedure requirements.

The simple “optout” is no longer sufficient, organisations are advised as set out by regulation 6 to utilise the form 4 or equivalent as it is mandatory to gain explicit consent from a data subject for the processing of personal information for the purpose of direct marketing through unsolicited electronic communication in terms of sect 69 (2) of the Act, this form 4 must capture the specific goods/services and communication method and its provisions can be applied electronically or over recorded telephone calls herewith link to the form <https://inforegulator.org.za/wp-content/uploads/2020/07/FORM-4-APPLICATION-FOR-THE-CONSENT-OF-A-DATA-SUBJECT-FOR-THE-PROCESSING-OF.pdf>. The responsibly party of the Organisation must prove that valid, informed consent was obtained by data subjects. This process will affect marketing strategies and plans.

Other changes included

*Clarifying roles and definitions (e.g., “complainant,” “complaint,” “day,” “office hours,” “relevant body/bodies”), reducing ambiguity for companies and the public. Refine enforcement mechanics, including flexibility around the payment of administrative fines and clearer complaint-handling pathways. Complement the Regulator’s updated data-breach reporting approach, including the e-portal notification process announced in April 2025.*

**Bottom line, all organisations must update their POPIA forms, processes, and staff training to match the new 2025 rules.**

#### Where PAIA stands in 2025 and what people mean by the “2022 amendments”

PAIA gives everyone the constitutional right to access records held by the state and by private bodies when needed to exercise or protect rights.

As set out by The Promotion of Access to Information Act 2020 as amended effective 1 January 2021 it became mandatory that all private companies, regardless of size become legally required to hold and maintain a PAIA manual (Section 51) detailing contact details of Information Officer, the categories of records the organisation holds, how people can access records, applicable fees and remedies available if access is denied.

With POPIA fully in effect from 1 July 2021, the Information Regulator also required companies to register their Information Offices and align PAIA manuals with POPIA compliance. It must also be noted that organisations must now conclude their annual reporting on data requests, even if none, for each financial year on the Information Regulators portal

### **How POPIA and PAIA work together**

- **Two rights, two pillars-** POPIA protects your privacy; PAIA protects your right of access. Together they balance openness with protection—ensuring people to get the records they need while safeguarding personal information.
- **Information Officers (IOs)-** Each public and private body must appoint an IO who is responsible for POPIA compliance and PAIA access processes (manuals, request handling, time frames).
- **The 2025 POPIA Regulation updates and the Regulator's PAIA role means IOs should align their forms, notices, and manuals accordingly.** Requests vs. protection: When a PAIA request includes personal information, POPIA's conditions apply—disclosure may be limited or redacted to protect privacy while still enabling access to non-personal parts of a record.
- **Breach and transparency:** If a data breach occurs, organisations must notify the Regulator and affected individuals (per POPIA), and PAIA still enables individuals to request records relevant to protecting their rights.

### **What organisations should do now**

1. Update POPIA forms and processes to the 17 April 2025 Regulation changes (objection, correction/deletion, consent, complaints etc.). Train staff and refresh privacy notices.
2. Review your PAIA Manual (Section 14/51) and request workflows to ensure alignment with the Regulator's mandates and current forms/guides.
3. Check your breach-response plan against the Regulator's e-portal reporting practices announced in April 2025.
4. Ensure your Information Officer is registered and that your POPIA and PAIA compliance tracks are integrated.

But this image is my truth: we are never insignificant. Our inner light matters (light of God). And when we let it shine, when we are kind and gracious (to others and to ourselves), we change the atmosphere around us.
